Derrick Brookins, Guest Musician



Derrick Brookins has served the students and parents in Texas Music Education for more than 24 years. Mr. Brookins' teaching experience spans a vast range of elementary and secondary choral music, from kindergarten to collegiate. Brookins has taught at Travis Jr. High in Irving, TX., Williams High School, and Plano Senior High School, in Plano, TX. Mr. Brookins has also served as a Professor of Choral Music for The University of Texas-Dallas. Currently, he serves as Dean of Music for Trivium Academy. A native of Fort Worth, Texas, Mr. Brookins has completed an honors undergraduate degree in choral music education from the University of North Texas and a Masters of

Secondary Education/Administration from Concordia University and is presently seeking his doctorate in education.

For thirteen years, Mr. Brookins studied under and performed with world-renowned choral musician Moses Hogan. As a choral music performer, Mr. Brookins has performed on four continents and for several European royal families and two US Presidents in venues such as the White House and the Sydney Opera House.

Mr. Brookins has twice been recognized as Teacher of the Year at Williams High School (2000) and again for Plano Senior High School (2008.) Mr. Brookins is a recipient of the Honorary Life Membership Award from the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers.

Mr. Brookins has served and demonstrated leadership skills for the Texas Music Educators Association at the Regional and Area Vocal Chairman's capacity for over ten years and served for two years as the Texas Music Educators Association State Vocal Chair. Mr. Brookins holds professional membership with the Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Choral Directors Association, American Choral Directors Association, and the Texas Music Adjudicators Association.

Derrick is also director of Choirs and Music Ministry at St. James Episcopal Church, Dallas.

History and Cultural Impact of "Lift Every Voice and Sing"

Scholars agree the song, endowed with its deep history of black pride, speaks to the universal human condition.

"Lift Every Voice and Sing" was written as a poem by James Weldon Johnson (1871–1938) in 1900 and set to music by his brother, J. Rosamond Johnson (1873–1954), for Lincoln's birthday in 1905.

In 1900, when "Lift Every Voice and Sing" was composed, Black Americans were teetering on a fulcrum of history. The visibility and influence of African-American traditions was growing, but Reconstruction efforts had failed to provide widespread opportunities for financial and educational advancement. Moreover, racism stood ready to close any door Black achievers dared to open.

Among the Black leaders of the day, education, artistic excellence and the power of Black communities of faith were both sources of strength and precious keys to progress. To many men and women like the Johnson brothers, who managed to find success, the rise of one Black American helped lift up all.

In this way, "Lift Ever Voice and Sing" was at one time a history, a proclamation, and a vision for the future. It immediately resonated with Black communities and institutions.

In 1919, the NAACP proclaimed it the "Negro National Anthem," a full 12 years before "The Star Spangled Banner" was adopted as the national anthem under President Herbert Hoover. It is an omnipresent part of African American worship traditions and an enduring refrain for great Black artists.

"Lift Every Voice and Sing" sets an atmosphere of reverence and gratitude—for the American journey of black people, for the selfless sacrifices of the ancestors, for an inheritance of indomitability and resilience.

BWIM Month of Preaching

In 2007, Baptist Women in Ministry invited Baptist churches to participate in Martha Stearns Marshall Month of Preaching by having a woman preach during the month of February. This invitation became an annual event, one that has been a deeply significant source of joy and discovery for many churches as they have celebrated the giftedness of women. The annual preaching month was named for Martha Stearns Marshall, an eighteenth-century Separate Baptist woman with a legacy of powerful preaching. In 2019, BWIM redreamed (and renamed) this emphasis to feature, in addition to Martha, three other significant Baptist preachers: Edna Lee de Gutiérrez, Ella Pearson Mitchell, and Helen Barrett Montgomery

Royal Lane joins BWIM in this celebration on February 7, 2021, with Joslyn Henderson, M.Div/M.M. Candidate, Baylor University, as preacher.

Born to Pastor Marty Henderson and First Lady Joyce James-Henderson, Joslyn Henderson has been using her talents to bless God's people from the time she was first able to walk and talk. Growing up as a pastor's kid (or "PK"), Joslyn had no problem getting up to sing in front of church audiences wherever and whenever her father preached. Despite Joslyn's plans to become a doctor, after hearing her sing in the 12th grade, her English teacher enthusiastically encouraged her to study music.

Following her teacher's advice, Joslyn went on to Spelman College

that fall to study music. Though she learned the complexities of classical vocalism through her studies and leadership in the Spelman College Glee Club, she never strayed from her gospel roots.

After graduating college, Joslyn completed a term of community service with AmeriCorps. Having learned the importance of giving back to others, she has since taken a full leap into gospel music. She has been studying, writing, and professing her love for music on any stage that will have her.

Joslyn Henderson is currently studying at Baylor University, pursuing graduate degrees in Church Music and Theology. She has served as the Ministry Associate for Worship & Chapel at Baylor, as well as served in many Waco churches as a staff member. In addition, Joslyn is also a proud member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated.
