Chapter 5 Sinai and Tabor

This chapter will argue that the juxtaposition of these two mountains in icons of the transfiguration serves the purpose in Christian history of reconciling tensions between old covenant and new, Jewish and Christian identities, the experience of finding oneself naked, empty and lost before God on Sinai and the experience of being clothed in light, filled with the image of Christ, and restored to new life on Tabor.
